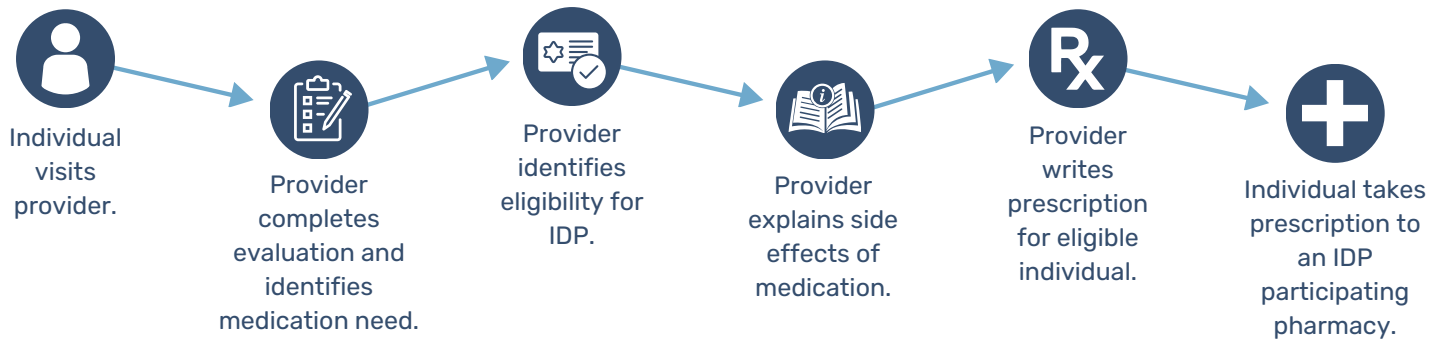

Indigent Psychiatric Medication Program

is also known as the Indigent Drug Program (IDP) and allows participating behavioral health providers to approve individuals determined to meet financial eligibility criteria for low cost (\$3) prescriptions of specific psychotropic medications at participating community-based pharmacies.
